

Headquartered in Baltimore, Maryland, Johns Hopkins Medicine is a \$5.38 billion integrated global health enterprise and one of the leading health systems in the United States.

- A nonprofit, Johns Hopkins Medicine combines its 120-year commitment to community care with groundbreaking research, teaching and medical services to patients worldwide.
- The Johns Hopkins Hospital has been ranked number one in the nation for 19 consecutive years by *U.S. News & World Report*.
- Johns Hopkins scientists receive more federal research support annually (\$437 million in 2008) than counterparts in other U.S. medical schools.
- Winning the 2009 Nobel Prize for Physiology or Medicine, Johns Hopkins Professor Carol Grieder joins 19 other current or former School of Medicine scientists as Nobel laureates.
- With 32,700 employees, Johns Hopkins is among Maryland's largest private employers and the largest in Baltimore City.
- Johns Hopkins' annual economic impact on Maryland totals \$6.4 billion.
- Continuing its century-old commitment to serve and nurture its community, Johns Hopkins Medicine provided \$245 million in uncompensated care in the most recent fiscal year.
- Johns Hopkins International brings world-class health care to more than 25 strategic projects in Europe, Asia, the Middle East and Latin America.

Johns Hopkins Medicine operates four academic and community hospitals, four suburban health care and surgery centers, and 18 primary health care outpatient sites; employs more than 3,850 physicians; and has 1.87 million outpatient visits annually.

- Johns Hopkins Medicine handles more than 97,440 inpatient admissions and performs more than 99,000 surgeries annually.
- The Johns Hopkins Hospital nursing program was the first in Maryland to receive Magnet designation from the American Nurses Credentialing Center.
- Each year, JHM handles more than 263,500 emergency visits.
- With 18 primary health care sites, Johns Hopkins Community Physicians handles more than 485,000 annual patient visits.
- The Johns Hopkins Home Care Group, a full-service home care provider, annually treats 82,000 adults and children in Central Maryland.
- Johns Hopkins HealthCare's managed care plans cover 230,000 people in three unique populations.

Going Forward

- Johns Hopkins is nearing completion of a \$994 million project—one of the largest hospital redevelopment efforts in U.S. history—to create an all-new Johns Hopkins Hospital in East Baltimore.
- Scheduled to open in 2011, the Sheikh Zayed Adult Cardiovascular and Critical Care Tower and the Charlotte R. Bloomberg Children's Center Tower will feature 560 private rooms, 33 new operating rooms and a mammoth emergency department.
- The Wilmer Eye Institute's \$105 million Robert H. and Clarice Smith Building and Maurice Bendann Surgical Pavilion, which opened in 2009, will provide surgery to 14,000 patients annually.
- The School of Medicine's new \$54.3 million, Anne and Mike Armstrong Medical Education Building, opened in 2009, offers state-of-the-art classrooms and labs to complement a new, groundbreaking curriculum, Genes to Society.
- The Science & Technology Park at Johns Hopkins project, now under construction, will provide 1.1 million square feet of lab and office space in East Baltimore. The research complex will house 30 to 50 companies.
